



KOREAN FLAVOUR AT ITS BEST AT THE TAMPINES

COURSE By Godfrey Robert

No surprise that 'Seoul Sisters' take the podium at Singapore Women's Open

ith two-thirds of the 102-woman field being South Koreans, the \$1.1 million Singapore Women's Open saw an outpouring of "kimchi kindred-ship" at Tanah Merah Country Club's Tampines course from Dec 9 to 11.

And with the Korean company Hana Financial Group being the sponsor, it was all about the Land of the Morning Calm not just for the three days but also the whole week.

So, the main talking point during the event was about the strength of the Koreans in the world of

women's golf with almost a third of the top 100-ranked golfers being Koreans.


The 70-strong Korean legion at the Tampines course raised conversation about how Pak Se Ri pioneered a Korean onslaught on the global women's game with the "Seoul Sister" remaining a name stuck in their DNA.











Pak was the only Korean on the LPGA Tour in 1998, her

Said Hong Ji-won, my pro-am flight partner who won the Hanwha Classic in Chuncheon, Gangwon in December: "Pak is the country's main ambassador. I was born two years after she won the US Open, but her name is still mentioned among my colleagues. She is an icon, and we all look up to her."







So numerically, the odds were in favour of a Korean winner for the \$198,000 title on a pristine course that the TMCC organisers had laid out.

And so it was, with Park Ji-young declared the winner after two rounds with the final day's play suspended because of inclement weather, causing only seven groups to set foot on the challenging layout before play was halted at 8.50 am.

The world No. 72 claimed the honours after shooting a six-under 66 on Friday and 67 on Saturday to win by a shot on 11-under 133, leaving compatriots Hong Jin-min, Park Hyun-kyung and Lee So-yong to claim joint-second spot.

It was Park Ji-young's fifth victory on the Korean LPGA Tour. She said: "Of course. I would have loved to have a round, but rules allow for a 36hole victory, so I'll savour it. I did accomplish come-from-behind victories previously, but never from a shortened tournament.

"So, it is really different. It feels very special. A win is always fulfilling regardless of how I attained it."

The home crowd had plenty to cheer as Singapore's leading professional Koh Sock Hwee, who shot 68 and 72, finished joint-26th, a position she shared with Hong Kong's star player Tiffany Chan, who registered a hole-inone on the first day.

Shannon Tan, the world No. 82 amateur, claimed the amateur title with rounds of 76 and 67.


For Shannon, 18, who studies at Texas Tech won the HSBC Women's Champions in the United States, this was her first cut in a professional event and she made it with the 67 on Saturday that propelled her from tied-88th to tied-53rd on Saturday, inside the cut of 60 and ties.





Former world No. 1 Shin Ji-yai, who at the Garden course in 2009, finished in the same position as Shannon with rounds of 74 and 69.

Despite the curtailed event, the field enjoyed two good rounds at a layout considered one of the best in the Asia-Pacific regio. Said Hong during the pro-am: "This was my first time on the course and I must say that it is a fabulous layout. Each hole has a distinctive character, and I love the par-threes. The par-four 15th is a tough hole and I found the bunker on my approach. I will surely want to come back."

That was what Diego Woodword Bennett bagged at Mini Putt Putt Golf event at TMCC's Garden location on.


Diego achieved the feat on hole 3, which was the second toughest hole in the event.

TMCC member Tang gives thumbs-up after organising week's outing at reciprocal clubs in Japan








t has been a tradition with Tanah Merah Country Club to be very selective of reciprocal clubs. In fact, TMCC's pioneering chairman Sim Kee Boon believed in the club's exclusivity and used to scrutinise applications from other clubs here and abroad keen on reciprocity.

That was why when member Christopher Tang was sold the idea by the club's marketing department of forming a group to make a reciprocal trip to Japan, he bought it straightaway.

Tang knew that it would be a good offer, and so with seven other golfers embarked on a trip that eventually turned out to be a "dream".

The party had a group structure, namely Tang (chairman/ organiser), Jeffrey Chua (captain/format of games, team composition/handicap adjustments), Masuda Yusuke (chief entertainment officer to handle all restaurant needs and logistics), Cheng Cheng Miang (treasurer to handle all green fees, meals and incidental expenses), and drivers (Roland Tan, Cheng, Masuda and Amos Tan). The others were club members Low Yeow Boon and Aaron Tan.





and three were guests. Their ages ranged from 60 to 65, handicap indexes from 12.5 to 24 and all were retired, semi-retired or working. They were bankers, ex-real estate professionals, SME bosses and investors.

Tang emphasised that this was not a club trip but one privately organised to test out the reciprocal arrangements with the Shinwa Group.

The idea to have an Autumn golf trip (from 6-12 Nov) to Japan Osaka/ Kyoto blended in with the marketing department's suggestion because during a post-game drinking session at TMCC Tampines last April when the party agreed to fly to Japan once Covid-restriction rules in the country were lifted. Said Tang: "Some of us had played in Japan before Covid and had thoroughly enjoyed the experience. The rest were eager. All were golf-travel starved by the Covid restrictions.

"The hiccup was that there was no clarity on when Japan would open up. We booked our air tickets and hotel feeling sure that the country would open by November and were rewarded.

"We do not know Japan courses well. We also took a bet that any reciprocal clubs with TMCC, will be of a high standard, and settled to play all four games with the Shinwa Group courses in Hyogo and Shiga prefectures. They were excellent courses."

Tang heaped praise on Samantha Leong, the club's assistant golf operations manager, who he said was excellent in liaising with the Shinwa Group for most of the arrangements, especially the administrative details.

The group played at Golden Valley Golf Club, Cherry Hills Golf Club, Shigaraki Golf Club (Tashiro course) and Shiga Golf Club, all of which was described by Tang as "beautiful and well maintained, with good clubhouse facilities and F&B."

Tang singled out Golden Valley Golf Club as "pretty and breathtakingly picturesque" while he described the mountainous Shiga Golf Club as "challenging and engaging."

Japan has always been a favourite destination for Singaporeans because the food, culture, and climate (particularly, in autumn and spring) are appealing. Also, the courses are quite easily available and affordable.

Even though this was a private trip, Shinwa Group representative Teppei Tani was on hand to receive the group at Golden Valley GC, which is located about an hour and a half's drive from Osaka to the course.

The reception at the clubs was very warm and it was smooth going all the way as the registrations were done well beforehand, the locker keys all prepared in advance and laid out.



PLAYING OFF SIDE HILL LIES

Follow these tips and you won't need to be

olf is a game of unpredictability, and part of the challenge – and joy – is to play it as it lies. Very often, we find ourselves where our balls are not sitting up nicely on flat, even ground – a situation not uncommon to those who frequently tee it up on our tough Tampines Course.

But you needn't be afraid of these shots, and here, I'll give you a few simple tips to help you manage your game if you ever find yourself in these situations.









Ball Above Your Feet

When your ball is above your feet (Pic 1), one thing to note is the tendency to hit it to the left (if you're right-handed) of your intended target. One of the reasons why this happens is that while the leading edge of your club seems to be aimed at the correct direction, the face of the club - because of the loft often faces to the left of this target (Pic 2). This in technical parlance is called 'face-plane tilt'.

In order to compensate for this, you will need to aim a little more right of your target in order to get the ball heading towards your aim.

Note that the more lofted the club (Pic 3), the further left of the target the clubface faces. You will have to adjust your aim accordingly when selecting different clubs for the shot. Follow this simple rule: more loft, aim more right of the target; less loft, aim less right of the target. A good rule of thumb to use is the 6-iron where you aim more or less at the target.

In this situation, your ball is also closer to your body. Some adjustments need to be made to the golf swing. First, you will need to hold the club further down the grip. You will also need to swing on a shallower plane (Pic 4a). And the last thing is to remember that this is a trouble shot so swing at 75% of your maximum effort, and make sure you don't follow an error with another.



Ball Below Your Feet

In this converse situation (Pic 5), the ball is now further away from your body.

Make sure you aim the clubface at the intended direction (Pic 6), which in this case means that you need to aim the leading edge of the club to the left of the target as the tendency is for the ball to move left to right on the shot.

Position the ball towards the back of your stance (Pic 7), and make sure you have enough flex in your knees to lower your body towards the ball (Pic 8). It is imperative that you maintain this flex through the swing to make solid contact. Grip the club towards the end of the grip as you will need the entire length of the club to hit the ball (Pic 9).

Opposite from the previous scenario, you will now need to make a more upright swing (Pic 10). Make a few practice swings to ensure that your club bottoms out in front of the ball (Pic 11). Stay confident and make the shot.

Follow these tips and you'll be hitting them sweetly off side hill lies in no time.

Method:

Mix all the ingredients together well. Marinate the meat overnight.

The next day, heat the oven to 190C for about 20 minutes. Place the marinated meat in the oven and roast. After 11 minutes, turn the meat over, and roast for an additional 11 minutes.





LOWER BACK

As we get older, lower back issues are one of the most common problems we face. Sports like tennis and golf put great strain on this part of our body, and if we are to continue enjoying these games, it pays to make sure our lower backs are strong and supple.



Lower Back Extensions

- Position yourself on the back extension bench in the gym. Make sure that your back and neck are straight. (Pic 1)
- 2. Put your hands behind your head (Pic 2), then slowly lower your body, bending at the waist till you're bent at 90 degrees (Pic 3). Slower raise your body, keeping your back straight to the start position. Repeat for 10 reps, and 2-3 sets.







Floor Superman



- 1. Lie face down on the floor on an exercise mat (Pic 4) with your arms extended in front of you, and your toes extended out.
- 2. Lift your legs, arms and head as high as they can go (Pic 5), keeping your knees and elbows straight. Lower to the start position for one rep. Repeat for 10 reps, and 2-3 sets. This is a great exercise for the core as well.
