25 YEARS OF PROTECTION OF THE GALÁPAGOS MARINE RESERVE. THROUGH ITS PERPETUAL PLANET INITIATIVE, ROLEX IS SUPPORTING OCEAN CONSERVATION NON-PROFIT MISSION BLUE IN ITS GOAL TO CREATE A GLOBAL NETWORK OF HOPE SPOTS, AREAS WITH MARINE ECOSYSTEMS WHOSE PROTECTION IS VITAL TO THE HEALTH AND FUTURE OF THE OCEANS.

The Galápagos Islands' abundant and unique ecosystems are home to species of plants and animals that cannot be found anywhere else on Earth. When legendary oceanographer, Sylvia Earle, first visited the archipelago in 1966 she remarked that it was "the sharkiest, fishiest place" she'd ever been. Yet, what makes it special also makes it vulnerable. As more people discovered the islands, invasive species were introduced and local resources came under increasing pressure.

A GROUNDBREAKING EXPEDITION

The Galápagos Islands were chosen as one of Earle's first Mission Blue Hope Spots in 2010; a place with abundant biodiversity that could show how human damage in the ocean can be reversed. Now, a groundbreaking expedition, led by Earle, adds to growing evidence of the need for increased marine protections.

Her efforts could not have come at a more critical time. Despite Ecuador establishing the Galápagos Marine Reserve in 1998 – an area covering 133,000 km² of the islands' waters – more work was needed to ensure the Galápagos would be used sustainably for years to come by residents, tourists and fishers.

In 2022, nearly 25 years on from the establishment of the Galápagos Marine Reserve, the time had come to assess the impacts of these protections. Sylvia Earle, a Rolex Testimonee since 1982, was joined by a multi-institutional team of scientists on a two-week expedition across the Hope Spot. Their wideranging research aims resulted in a comprehensive assessment of the marine ecosystem in the region, identifying both challenges and opportunities for future conservation efforts.

A BLUEPRINT FOR SUCCESS

A large part of the expedition was devoted to revealing the hidden and forgotten diversity beneath the waves to provide a baseline value of ecosystem health that can be tracked by future surveys. Employing cutting edge technology such as environmental DNA (eDNA) and underwater video systems, the team uncovered vital population data for little-studied animals such as seahorses and endemic slipper lobsters. eDNA analysis isolates traces of animal DNA that is left behind in the water column, which may have otherwise gone unnoticed.



It would not be the first discovery for the team. In a previous year, Sylvia Earle and Salome Buglass of the Charles Darwin Foundation uncovered new species of kelp deep under the surface. During the 2022 expedition the pair boarded the "DeepSee" submersible, in order to extend their explorations of the depths, and surfaced excitedly with footage of lush forests. There are tentative theories that these rich kelp forests play a critical role in supporting the biodiversity of the region.

THINKING LIKE AN OCEAN

The expedition team continued long-term research into the transoceanic movements of marine animals, capturing location tags recording the migration of sharks from as far away as the Mexican Gulf and coastal Costa Rica. These findings are a potent argument for international cooperation in expanding marine protection.

The expedition team also surveyed turtle habitats, mapped the foraging grounds of penguin colonies and measured levels of microplastics. Such a wide range of field work will help conservationists to, as Earle puts it, "think like an ocean" – recognizing the connectivity of ecosystems and that, for marine life, there are no boundaries.

To this end, in 2021, Ecuador, Panama, Colombia and Costa Rica announced the creation of the Eastern Tropical Pacific Marine Corridor initiative, joining and increasing protected waters – to create a fishing-free "swimway" in a critical migratory route for sharks, turtles, rays and whales. While this is an important step forward, the work of Earle and her expedition team shows that there is a need to further widen and increase the number of swimways.

Manuel Yepez and Alex Hearn are Mission Blue's Galápagos Islands Hope Spot co-Champions, inspirational figures in the protection of a key part of the ocean. Hearn, from the Galápagos Science Center, was the principal investigator on the expedition under Earle's leadership and convened the international team of scientists who took part. He believes that "if we can get it right here [in the Galápagos], that is a blueprint for getting it right across the planet."

This engagement was reinforced with the launch of the Perpetual Planet Initiative in 2019, which initially focused on individuals who contribute to a better world through the Rolex Awards for Enterprise, on safeguarding the oceans as part of an established association with Mission Blue, and on understanding climate change via its long-standing partnership with the National Geographic Society.

An expanding portfolio of other partnerships embraced by the Perpetual Planet Initiative now includes: Cristina Mittermeier and Paul Nicklen in their work as conservation photographers; Rewilding Argentina and Rewilding Chile, offspring organizations of Tompkins Conservation, which are protecting landscapes in South America; Coral Gardeners, transplanting resilient corals to reefs; Steve Boyes and the Great Spine of Africa series of expeditions, exploring the continent's major river basins; the Under The Pole expeditions, the boundaries of underwater pushing exploration; the B.I.G expedition to the North Pole in 2023, gathering data on threats to the Arctic; and the Monaco Blue Initiative, bringing together ocean conservation experts. This time, perfect weather allowed the kids to compete freely and the highlight of the day was a hole-in-one feat.


Elijah Tan bagged an ace on hole 8, considered to be one of the toughest holes in the event.

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


The welcomed flip side to the cancellation of the golf game was that there were more prizes for the lucky draw and games, and many went home with goodies.


A scrumptious banquet spread was served, which included crowd favourite dishes such as the steamed cod fish, roasted duck, sauteed scallops and glutinous rice.

PLAYING OFF UP AND DOWNHILL LIES

Follow these tips and you won't need to be afraid of these tricky shots anymore.

nlike the predictability of the range, we're often faced with uneven lies on the golf course. Uphill and downhill lies are part and parcel of the game, and knowing how to negotiate them is key to playing well.









Uphill Lies

When faced with an uphill lie (Pic 2), the first thing you need to do is to test the lie. Take a normal stance behind the ball and try to brush the ground with a short swing (Pic 2a). You will notice that the club bottoms out in front of the ball. What this tells you is that you need to position the ball slightly forward of your stance towards your lead foot (Pic 3). You will also need to widen your stance (Pic 4) for stability, and maintain a shoulder line that is parallel with the slope (Pic 5).





Once you are in this position, simply address the ball and swing through. Note that your balance will be compromised so don't try to hit the ball at maximum speed. Make sure that your legs are braced and provide a solid stance, maintain your spine angle, and focus on good contact and following through.

Note that with uphill lies, there is a tendency to hit the ball on a right-to-left path (righthanders) so you need to aim accordingly.

Downhill Lies

With downhill lies (Pic 6), you just do the opposite.

First, test the lie (Pic 7) to see where your club bottoms out or contacts the ground. You will notice that this is at a point that's towards the trailing foot (Pic 8). This means you will need to position your ball further back in the stance, somewhere below your right chest, depending on how steep the slope is (Pic 9).

Widen your stance, and make sure your shoulder line is parallel with the slope (Pic 10). Swing through at 75 per cent effort with a strong, braced stance. With downhill lies, you will face a tendency for the ball to move left to right (right-handers), so you will need to aim appropriately.











Method:

Mix all the ingredients together well. Marinate for about 30 minutes (Pic 2)

Roll out the dough, then cut it into 12-15cm diameter circles.

Spoon the chicken/potato curry mixture into one side of the dough circle (Pic 3), fold over, and seal the ends (Pic 4). Brush with egg wash for that golden colour after cooking (Pic 5).

Place in an oven preheated to 165C (Pic 6). Bake for 35 minutes, remove and let cool.

bout 50 metres away, a maintenance worker was earnestly clearing the ground for a temporary green for the eighteenth hole of the Tampines course.

Sitting with me at the Tampines clubhouse was an excited Alex, who shifted and turned incessantly to watch the worker.

It was in the midst of an interview, and the hardworking Alex Chong felt that he had to observe the worker.

After all, as facilities supervisor at Tanah Merah Country Club, Alex was just showing his commitment to his job which is all-encompassing and varied.

His duties include minor repairs to all facilities, ensuring that the restrooms are up-to-date and the air-conditioning at all outlets are in good working order.

That means, his is not a sedentary job, but one that sees him moving about and making clear observances.

That was why his focus during the interview occasionally strayed from Q and A to noticing what is happening everywhere, from the clubhouse to the course and roofs and beyond.

The 45-year-old father of two teenagers (a boy and a girl) who hails from Sabah, has his family in Johor but resides here (at Bedok) and makes weekly or fortnightly visits to JB to see his parents as a responsible worker.



He is in his second stint at TMCC, having joined the club in 2004, worked elsewhere for three years and then returned to the prestigious club in 2013 because it is like a "second home" to him.

The ever-smiling Alex is in charge of a small team, and he leads from the front and inspires his colleagues.

He also looks after the aeration of the ground, the landscaping at the waterfall and the restoration areas, so he is not shy to get his hands dirty.

Tall, strong and muscular, the bespectacled Alex also enjoys golf as a 22-handicapper, but although he is allowed to play once a week on maintenance days, he does not use the privilege often because of his tight family and working schedule.

He has never played in any other course but the two courses at TMCC, Garden and Tampines, and finds them "spectacular".

Alex makes use of the company transport to and from home every day, and Alex considers this a good offering by the club.

"The club treats me well. I make a lot of friends. And on days when the club stages major golf events, I get to see some top-class golfers from around the world," says Alex.

He works around the philosophy "that once you get yourself to enjoy your work, half the battle is won."

"And you perform better," says Alex, the model worker.







UPPER BACK

Back muscles are important in almost everything we do – whether we swing a golf club, lift grocery bags, or just carry things around. Here are several simple exercises you can do at the TMCC gym to make sure they're strong and supple.



Assisted Pull-ups

Select an appropriate weight on the pull-up machine. Carefully kneel on the platform, holding onto the pull-up bars (Pic 1). With arms outstretch as the start position, pull yourself up till your chin clears the bars (Pic 1a). Lower yourself to the start position. Do 8-10 reps for 2-3 sets.

Machine Rows

Sit at the row machine at a level where your arms are parallel to the ground, and the handles allow a comfortable reach with the arms sufficiently outstretched (Pic 2). Pull the handles towards the chest (Pic 2a), then back to the start position. Do 10-12 reps for 203 sets.





Bent-over Flies

Stand with your feet shoulder-width apart, with dumbells in your hands (Pic 3). Bend over keeping your back straight, and parallel to the ground (Pic 3a). Lift the weights upwards keeping your arms as straight as possible (Pic 3b), then back to the start position in pic 3a. Do 10-12 reps for 2-3 sets.


