TMCC HAS COME THROUGH TOUGH TIMES WITH S\$500K OPERATING SURPLUS

Balanced budget, cost mitigation and initiation of sustainability efforts put club in healthy position

uring a period of economic uncertainty hampered also by the gloom of post-Covid-19 pandemic, Tanah Merah Country Club has come through the financial year with more than satisfactory results.

The club enhanced its status as a premium golf club by maintaining a healthy financial position and is a model for environmental, social and governance (ESG) championing.

FY2022 ended with a modest operating surplus of S\$500,000 despite a period of higher expenses due to inflation, wage increases (because of the Government's undated progressive wage model) and higher energy costs.

As Club President Ronald Ong said at the in-person 40th annual general meeting (AGM) on April 28, this was in line with the Club's mission to continue to balance the budget and mitigate cost pressure while being cognisant that service standards cannot be compromised.

Among the highlights was the initiation of sustainability efforts, like the introduction of solar power, replacing some fossil fuel energy with solar panels at the Tampines course with its viability at the Garden course being reviewed. Also, the management has initiated other ESG efforts such as less paper and plastic usage and harnessing technological applications moving towards digitalisation.

In the last financial year, the club successfully hosted three premium tournaments, namely the Hana Financial Group Singapore Women's Open, The Asian Tour's The International Series and The Singapore International, which enhanced the club's value and status as a premium golf club in the region.

The club will also look into improving the menu at the dining outlets at both the Garden and Tampines locations as suggested by some members at the AGM. The F&B committee will also assess the operating hours of the dining outlets.

Emphatically, TMCC is moving with the times. And while you pore through this physical e-magazine, note that this will be the last club issue in this format.

As part of the club's continuing efforts to reduce its carbon footprint, the club will transition to a web-based portal from the next issue. With the new format, members can enjoy a streamlined, more intuitive, and interactive way to access up-to-date news and happenings instantaneously in the active events calendar.

The thinking behind the change is also to allow members to be proactive and interact with the Club management and editorial team.

The Club is also proud that it recently signed an affiliation with Japan's Shinwa Golf Group when a team from the Kyoto club visited TMCC on March 22.

The purpose of the partnership was three-fold:


- a) To promote friendship and business through the game of golf.
- b) To promote the relationship between both clubs.
- c) To provide added value for all members.

On the same day, the official signing ceremony of the reciprocal agreement between TMCC and Shinwa Golf Group was completed.

The club has also organised many events for its members, and the highlight was the club's Match Play Championships which saw intense competition at the challenging Tampines course. Both the Men's and Women's championships were marathon events, stretching into a play-off decided on the second extra hole.

Talented Bruce Kwong beat Ken Sugino in the men's competition and the "evergreen" Norlia Embong edged out Meylinda Setyo in the women's event.

In the qualifying round of the tournament, the best net winners, Stanley Ang and Sue Yap, were selected to compete in the pro-am event of the LIV Golf's Super Monday programme on May 1.



40TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

TMCC's 40th Annual General Meeting (AGM) was convened on Friday, 28 April 2023, at the Garden Banquet Room. The meeting began at 6:30pm with 52 Principal Members and 3 spouses in attendance, thus achieving a quorum. Following a two-year virtual AGM that entails voting in absentia during the Covid-19 pandemic, the AGM was held in-person this year.



President's Opening Address

A year ago, the General Committee had set forth their objectives for the Club to maintain and enhance its status as a premium golf club, maintain a healthy financial position, and be an environmental, social and governance (ESG) champion overtime.

The Club continues to achieve a healthy balance sheet and P&L which is critical to maintaining the financial sustainability of the Club. FY2022 ended with a modest operating surplus of approximately S\$500K, amidst a period of higher expenses, attributed by inflation, wage increases (due to government's undated progressive wage model), and higher energy cost.

It is the Club's mission to continue to balance the budget and to mitigate cost pressure, while being cognizant that its service standards cannot be compromised.

Sustainability efforts have been initiated. One of the initiatives is solar power, replacing some fossil fuel energy with solar panels at the Tampines course and its viability at the Garden course is currently being reviewed as well. Solar panels can help to save electricity cost by about 50%.



Management has initiated other ESG efforts such as less paper and plastic usages and harnessing technological applications moving towards digitalization.

TMCC successfully hosted 3 premium Golf Tournaments in the last financial year; Hana Financial Group Singapore Women's Open, The International Series Singapore and The Singapore International. Players and their entourage experienced the Club's impeccable course condition and the clubhouse facilities at the Tampines location. These tournaments will continue to enhance the Club's value and status as a premium golf club in the market.

TMCC golf courses at Garden and Tampines are our pride and joy and greatest assets. Apart from traditional maintenance for the courses to be in pristine playing condition, various projects were introduced to heighten the overall golfing experience, such as the floral and fauna enhancement and bunkering designs.

It is an absolute honour and privilege to serve all the Members. The encouragement we have received, reminded me of what a brilliant Club TMCC is, and I thank you for your valuable feedback and friendship.

I would also like to thank the General Committee's constant attention to details and hard work. A special appreciation to the Chairman, Deputy Chairman and Honorary Senior Advisor for their continued support, encouragement and advise. I would also like to give due recognition for the Management team's unwavering dedication and hard work for the Club.

With the quorum met, I shall call the 40th AGM to order.

AGM Proceedings

At the AGM, three resolutions on the agenda – confirmation of minutes of the last AGM 2021, receival of annual report and accounts for financial year and reappointment of Deloitte &

Touche as external auditors were duly passed by Members with an overwhelming majority of votes.

The Question and Answer (QnA) segment at the AGM turned out to be a pleasant affair as Members' interest was evident. Relevant questions were raised, and constructive answers were provided promptly.

Mr Chris Chen (C46), a long-time Member for more than 40 years, started things off by raising two suggestions. The first suggestion is to revamp the F&B menu at the Golfers' Terrace and Garden View Restaurant, considering that the menu items have not been refreshed for a very long time. He also opined that the Club should also explore new facilities catered for younger Members.

In response, Club President thank the Member for their comments and emphasized that the Club will continue to focus to improve the clubhouse for the benefit of all members. F&B Convenor, Mr Benny Tay added that the F&B menus are undergoing revamp and will be launch in due course.

Member Mr Eddy Goh (G1322) expressed his delight that the new F&B menus will be launched soon. He shared that the quality of food from the Club's golfers' terraces is lacking and requires more attention to maintain food quality consistency. He also cited that the introduction of new food recommendations such as Tomahawk steak are good initiatives, but the timing to which the dish is made available is very limited for members to have the opportunity to enjoy the delicacy. He ended his query by commending the

F&B crew for their consistently outstanding service delivery.

The General Committee thanked the Member for his suggestions and will provide a response in due time. The F&B Committee will also assess the current operating hours of the dining outlets and balance out the opportunity cost for internal decision making.

On issues pertaining to golf course maintenance, Member Mr Eric Ng (N2411) pointed out that the chipping green at the Garden Course has no sand refilling bucket for Members to repair the divots. He also cited that the bunker sand at Hole 8 of Garden Course is washed out and will require restoration for optimal playability. He added that the road barriers erected to prevents buggies from entering are built too low which creates a safety hazard that can cause Members to trip and fall. Member suggested raising the height of the ropes or provide a wider walking distance.

In response, Club Captain Dr Goh Hoon Pur assured that the Greens Committee is mindful of these issues and will consider the suggestions for improvement where feasible.

As the QnA segment draws to a close, President Ong made his ending remark and shared that the Club would continue to improve and maintain the Club's premier status in the coming year, amidst the challenging economic situation, while striving to maintain financial viability and stainability.

On behalf of the General Committee, President Ong thanked all Members for attending the AGM and concluded the meeting at 6:50pm.




With the eNews portal, Members can look forward to the following benefits:

ACS (I) student stays calm and cool to clinch Match Play title

rmed with the National Ranking Game title for which he came from a seven-shot deficit to win by three shots, Bruce Kwong, whose personal best of five-under 67 did the trick, was the name on most participants' lips.

And the disciplined 14-year-old Anglo-Chinese School (Independent) student delivered in an exciting manner to claim the Tanah Merah Country Club's Match Play men's title at the Tampines course.





Bruce beat a polished Ken Sugino, but not in the easiest of manners in the final. The teenager needed to win on the 20th hole play-off for the popular title.

Said the respectful Bruce, who plays and practices between four and six times a week in between studies and other commitments, edged out the game Sugino, a good all-round golfer.

As he recounted: "The final match against Ken, which went into a playoff, was a tough match, but I managed to play well and never trailed. I was extremely pleased with that as Ken is a great player.

"The play-off was intense from the start. Both of us found the green in two in the first play-off hole. Ken missed a birdie putt which left me to take advantage. "But I could not do it, so we carried on to the second hole, a tough and long par-four.

"Here, Ken found the greenside bunker with his second shot, and I hit my 145-metre approach to about 20 feet from the pin.

"Ken then made bogey and I two-putted for a decent par that proved to be the winner."

In the semi-finals, Bruce had the better of a gutsy Samir Bedi, who has won a few titles over the past few years. He said: "I definitely faced my set of challenges against Samir but I handled them really well.


"I was one down until the seventh hole, on which I made birdie to tie the match. From then on, I did not trail again, winning holes 10 and 14 for a two-hole advantage.

"But on the 17th hole, Samir reduced the lead to one. But on the 18th, there was some pressure on me but I stayed calm and edged out Samir with a birdie from 10 feet to seal the deal."

An elated Bruce, who picked up the game at 3 but became serious only at 8, celebrated the victory with a grand dinner with his family.

After edging out gutsy Meylinda Setyo in the second play-off hole for the Tanah Merah Country Club's Match Play women's title on Sunday, 30 April, she heaped praise on her opponent.

"Meylinda is a strong player. She brought out the best in me. And she was unlucky to find the bunker with her drive in the challenging long par-four deciding hole of the Tampines course.

"She blasted out from the left bunker and ended up with a Double Bogey while I made a safe bogey to claim the title," said Norlia, the unassuming champion. It was very close in regulation play and in the first play-off hole, the two finalists played bogey to stretch the game.

"I was two on, but three-putted while Meylinda was on in three and two-putted on the first par-four play-off hole," added Norlia. "In fact, the deciding factor in our game was which player made the fewer mistakes.





"But I knew that she would be a tough opponent. All credit to her for her fighting ability."

Said a smiling Meylinda on the play-off defeat: "It is an honour playing with Norlia. She is a solid player with a good all-round game. We are good friends, and I would like to think that she gave me chance".

It was a tough week for the down-to-earth Norlia, who also retained her Singapore National Senior Championship title at the Singapore Island Country Club's Island Course with scores of 10-over 82, 84 and 78.

The always smiling Norlia, playing off a course handicap of 11, played two tough games before reaching the Match Play final. She beat the battle-hardened Michelle Ang 2 & 1 in the quarterfinals, and the combative Sue Yap (course handicap 18) 1-up in the semi-finals.

Sue, an accomplished golfer was TMCC's choice for pro-am of the recent LIV Golf tournament at Sentosa Golf Club's Serapong Course because she returned the best net score during the club's Match Play qualifying round.

BRUCE SHOWS MATURITY IN

The TMCC junior fights back with five-under 67 to claim NRG crown

ike his idol Tiger Woods, Bruce Kwong started playing golf at a very young age. And like Woods, parental influence played the biggest part in introducing the game to Bruce, whose dad Bosco and mum Eva still play the game.

It is said that the American phenomenon Woods first held his club at the age of 2, and at 4 was already showing his precocity at the game. Bruce started playing golf at 3 while residing in Hengzhou, China, where his dad Bosco was the VP of a bank before moving back to Singapore.

And those hours on the driving range and occasional course rounds have helped Bruce transform from a PC holder into a 0.0 handicapper within a decade. To many youngsters, that comes with regular practice

and play, but Bruce had to carefully balance between studies and sport and overcome tedium before he could call himself a potential champion.

And champion he became recently when he came from behind to claim the National Ranking Game title at the Keppel/Sime course at Sime Road in sensational style.

The 14-year-old Anglo-Chinese School (Independent) Secondary Three student shot rounds of 76, 76 and 67 for an impressive three-over total of 219.

With seven birdies rued by only two bogeys on the final day, Bruce beat runner-up Troy Storm (72-78-72) by three shots for the title.

Bruce attributed his always-consistent short game and superb putting for his third-round score that turned the tables after being seven shots behind Brayden Lee, who finished third with 72-73 and 77.

The affable Bruce considers his approach shots to be his forte – honed through consistent practice and play, especially at the undulating greens of Tanah Merah Country Club.





After impressing at the SGA Talent Identification Day at Sentosa in 2020, Bruce was handpicked as the youngest talented golfer to join the Singapore Golf Association's National Junior Squad.

Under the expert guidance of TMCC coach Daren Lim and professional golfer Marc Ong at the Coast Road Club, Bruce has been refining his skills and making steady progress in the game.

With the strong support from SGA and TMCC, Bruce is able to play golf three or four times a week and works hard on distance control and mental strength, in between some gym work.

He is happy with his drives of between 250 and 260 metres, which he believes always puts him in strong positions. On his recent victory, Bruce says: "It is one of

my best showings, and I hope I can keep such consistency."

He continues to draw inspiration from Woods, after having been consumed by the video of the American's 2000 US Open triumph at Pebble Beach.

Said Bruce: "I know that I started playing way after Tiger's majestic reign of the golfing world, but I still watch his videos. Another enjoyable video was that of Tiger at the 2008 US Open when he carried an injury."

Bruce's great performance is also a credit to the TMCC junior programme which has been crafted by the club's coaches such as Daren Lim, Marc Ong, and club committee members supporting the juniors. Despite the accolades, Bruce remains humble and would like to thank his regular TMCC weekend playing group and golfing friends. Their company has not only honed Bruce's golfing skills but also made him more mature, allowing him to enjoy golf even more.



HOW TO PREVENT EARLY EXTENSION By Justin Tang, TMCC Teaching Pro

Early extension on the downswing is a death knell of good ball-striking. What is this and how do we solve it? TMCC Teaching Pro Marc Ong has some answers.

or pulling your shots to the left? Chances are, your problem is the dreaded early extension.

This occurs when, on your downswing, your hips thrust forward too early (Pic 1a and 1b), before you actually impact the ball. The result is often the club approaching the ball from too steep an angle and the toe of the clubhead digging into the ground. A shot that shoots towards the right is a common result of this.

One drill you can try to solve this is the one-handed swing drill. Grip down on a short club (Pic 2), like a pitching wedge or 9-iron, with your right hand (for right-handers). Take a short backswing (Pic 2a) with just the right hand, and swing through the ball (Pic 2b) making sure to keep the hips in the same position throughout. Focus on keeping the right elbow closer to the body, and maintaining the spine angle through the swing. After impact, rotate through to a finished position with your belt buckle facing the target.











Another drill you can do is the hip-to-wall drill, which you can do anywhere. Start by taking a setup posture with your butt touching the wall (Pic 4). Holding a club across your chest, rotate back like taking a backswing, keeping your right butt cheek against the wall (Pic 5).

Rotate through on a simulated downswing while keeping the left butt cheek touching the wall (Pic 6). This will help you maintain hip position on your golf swing. You will notice that when the hips move away from the wall on your downswing, you've extended too early.

These two simple drills will help you on your way to solving your early extension woes, and having you improve your ball-striking in no time.





INGREDIENTS

Red sauce (Pic 1):

Red sugar 50g

Egg white from 1 egg

Sweet potato flour 5g

Corn starch 5g

Water 150ml

Red colouring to taste

Chilli paste 150g
Chilli sauce 50g
Garlic, minced 50g
Sugar 60g
White vinegar 50ml
Water 150m
Crushed peanut 20g





Prawn cracker 1 piece
Sotong ball 2
Century egg 1
Spring roll 2
Chicken ngo hiang 1
Fish cutlet 1
Egg roll 1
Tau kwa 1
Pickled ginger 50g

METHOD

- Make the red sauce (Pic 4) bring the water to a boil with the red sugar. When the sugar is melted, add the sweet potato flour and corn starch (mixed in a little water). Stir till it's thickened slightly. Add the egg white and stir till it sets (Pic 5). Add one or two drops of red colouring. Top with the crushed peanuts and set aside.
- 2. Make the chilli sauce add all ingredients except for the peanuts into a pot (Pic 6). Heat for 5 6 minutes until the garlic is cooked, and all the ingredients are well incorporated (Pic 7). Set aside.
- 3. Heat oil in a wok. Add each individual ingredient and deep fry till they're cooked and golden brown (Pic 8). Remove, cut into pieces and set on a platter (Pic 9).
- 4. Serve hot with the chilli and red sauce.

rom 10 - 12 April 2023, TMCC organised a 3-day Occupational First Aid Training course

for its staff. The course was conducted by trainers from the Singapore Emergency Responder Academy (SERA), which is known for providing quality firstaid training to individuals and organisations.

The objective of the course was to equip the staff with the knowledge and skills necessary to provide first aid to adult casualties and use the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) safely

In the event of an accident or emergency, employees who have received first aid training can provide effective treatment not only for members, guests, and colleagues but also for their loved ones and even the broader public. For emergencies such as cardiac arrest, having knowledgeable individuals who can respond quickly and effectively can provide a comforting level of assurance to those affected and help to minimize any chaos while awaiting the arrival of the Emergency Medical Team.

ROTATIONAL EXERCISESBy Bharatt Lamsall, TMCC Fitness Instructor

In many sports like golf and racket games, the ability to rotate through your swing is key to more power. The motion of swinging through is a result of strong and flexible muscles in the core, back, hips, shoulders, and legs.



We are fortunate at TMCC as there is a unique exercise machine called the Cable Cross (Pic 1) that can easily help us build the strength in those parts of our bodies through proper rotational exercises.

Bharatt Lamsall, our TMCC Fitness Instructor offers us three exercises that are easy to do on the Cable Cross machine.

Cable Wood Chop Low-to-High

Start with the handle of the cable in the lowest position. Align your feet so that both hands are to your side when holding the cable handle (Pic 2). Using your core, hips, back and legs, pull the cable diagonally upwards as high as your hands can go, while keeping the arm straight (Pic 2a). Slowly return the cable back to the start position. Do 8 - 10 reps for 3 sets, on each side.





Cable Wood Chop High-to-Low

Position the handle of the cable to the highest position. Hold the handle with both hands positioned to the side of your body (Pic 3). Using your core, hips, back, and with legs firmly planted on the ground, pull the handle down diagonally to the other side of your body, finishing as low as you can go while keeping your arms and back straight (Pic 3a). Slowly return the handle to the start position. Do 8 – 10 reps for 3 sets, on each side.







In both the above exercises, focus on keeping the arms and back straight, and using the core to perform the movement. Start with lighter weights to get a feel of the correct movement, and then progress from there.

Single-arm Cable Wood Chop High-to-Low


This is a variation of the two-arm version but only uses one arm. Hold the handle of the cable with one arm with your body in a similar start position to the Cable Wood Chop High-to-Low. Align your other arm parallel to the one holding the handle (Pic 4). Using the arm holding the handle, pull the cable across your chest till the hand reaches your armpit. Keep the other hand pointing upwards in the original position (Pic 4a). Slowly return the cable to the start position. Do 8-10 reps for 3 sets, on each side.
